Dear Clara,

Hope you all are in the best of health and are doing fine. We are all o.k. here. The past couple of days the temp. has been below zero and this morning it is up to +38 so far. The snow is melting. Are you getting ready for Christmas yet? I ordered the kids things ten days ago and they are coming through already. I send to Wards in Portland, Oregon. I wish I would have gotten things from wards before. Their things are very nice and reasonable in price. I can get things cheaper through them than bying it through the p.x. I get everything through the APO number and that is to Seattle, Wash. from there I don't pay the postage unless its sent to the house.

Well I'll tell you why I am writing again. Louie has put in his papers for an appointment as a Warrent Officer in the army. We need some information to finish up his paper work. I am writing to you to phone these people and get the information and send it to us. It would take too long to write everyone individually. So here goes what we need.

First: Where was your mother born: The name of the city and country in Europe.
What was the port of entry into this country and the date she entered.
What is the passport number :
What is the naturalization number: Where was she naturalized and the date.

Also we need the same information for your father, as I asked for your mother above. I hope mom has some papers on this information.

Second: We need the full names that is the first middle and last name of all the brothers and sisters of you and Louie.
After the names also need the full date of birth, that is the day month and year.

I know this is a lot to ask but all the information is needed as soon as possible. Also tell the family that there will be an F.B.I. man around to confirm this and talk to them. They aren't to get excited and not answer him properly. I am writing to my parents also they will get a visit from him. I can hear the old man now if the F.B.I. walks in on him and he doesn't know he is coming. There is a lot of things to go through to be an officer but its worth it. You ought to have seen the paper work that Louie had to get filled out. I hope there isn't a lot of trouble to get all of this and I hope mom has her papers.

The kids got their report cards last week. Stevie got all C's and C+'s. His teacher won't mark any higher. He getsmost all his papers correct or one wrong. Vonnie got a C, two D's and two F's. I don't know if she will make it this year or not. They mark harder up here than back in the states.

The time seems to be going slow now since we are getting close to leaving. We are waiting for his next assignment on what post we will be going to.
